The Communal Blessing of a Rich History

WE GATHER

"The land upon which we gather is part of the traditional territory of the Lenni-Lenape, called "Lenapehoking." The Lenape People lived in harmony with one another upon this territory for thousands of years. During the colonial era and early federal period, many were removed west and north, but some also remain among the continuing historical tribal communities of the region: The Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Tribal Nation; the Ramapough Lenape Nation; and the Powhatan Renape Nation, The Nanticoke of Millsboro Delaware, and the Lenape of Cheswold Delaware. We acknowledge the Lenni-Lenape as the original people of this land and their continuing relationship with their territory. In our acknowledgment of the continued presence of Lenape people in their homeland, we affirm the aspiration of the great Lenape Chief Tamanend, that there be harmony between the indigenous people of this land and the descendants of the immigrants to this land, "as long as the rivers and creeks flow, and the sun, moon, and stars shine."

LOVERS, REBELS, & PROPHETS

In the steps of: Rev. A. Finley Schaef

The Rev. A. Finley Schaef, served as minister in the United Methodist Church for four decades at four congregations: First Methodist Church of Astoria (now Good Shepherd UMC Queens), Grace Methodist Church of St. Albans (Queens), Washington Square Methodist Church (Manhattan) and Park Slope United Methodist Church in Brooklyn. He received his postgraduate biblical and theological training at Union Theological Seminary in New York and graduated in 1957. He was an early activist in a broad spectrum of social protest movements through the 1960's and 1970's. He marched with The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Selma, Alabama and later, participated in the movement to end the Vietnam War.

After arriving at the Washington Square Methodist Church in 1966, Rev. Schaef co-convened the Clergy Consultation Service on Abortion with The Rev. Howard Moody of Judson Memorial Church in 1966. On May 22, 1967, *The New York Times* carried an announcement of the Service, including the names of Rev. Schaef, Rev. Moody, 17 other ministers and two rabbis. The clergy committed themselves to "referral to the best medical advice and aid to women in need." By the time of the U. S. Supreme Court Roe v. Wade decision, more than 1,400 clergy joined the Service, having referred 100,000 women for abortion without a single fatality.

During the height of the Vietnam War, the Washington Square Church, known as the Peace Church provided draft counseling to hundreds of young men seeking an alternative route to the draft into the Vietnam War. In 1969 Rev. Schaef joined several U.S. Peace activists to meet with leaders of the National Liberation Front of North Vietnam in Budapest, Hungary in attempts to negotiate peace talks. The Arts community was also vital to the worship and workings of Washington Square Church with Bread and Puppet Theater, The Living Theater, The Open Theater and The Polish Laboratory Theater performing at the Church.

Rev. Schaef served at the Park Slope United Methodist Church in Brooklyn for 25 years. It was a church known "for dedicating itself to fight all forms of oppression based on race, gender, sexual orientation and social class." Park Slope United Methodist Church was a central meeting place for community activists such as "Gay Friends and Neighbors", CISPES (Committee in Solidarity for El Salvador), Brooklyn Sister City Project with the people of Nicaragua, BEC / Brooklyn Energy Cooperative - a faith-based community organizing project that developed affordable housing for neighbors. Rev. Schaef joined the Pastors for Peace Convoy to Nicaragua and made trips to Panama, Nicaragua, Haiti and Cuba. In 1989, documentary television producer Bill Moyers, included Rev. Schaef in his PBS series "God and Politics" which focused on the struggle within the United Methodist Church over placement of missionaries to Sandinista held Nicaragua.

Park Slope Church as a community also focused on its spiritual relationship to the earth. A garden was created where the congregation reflected on the relationship of the earth, spirituality and religion, core to their beliefs. Rev. Schaef was President of the North American Conference for Christianity and Ecology (NACCE) and welcomed the Rev. Thomas Berry, world renowned theologian and teacher of earth spirituality, to the pulpit. Upon his retirement, the church garden was named "The Schaef Earth Garden."

In 1997, Rev. Schaef was quoted in a New York Times article marking his retirement, ("Religious Left Draws Strength From Grass Roots", New York Times, June 21, 1997), "... Very, very few other institutions have communities. We can go out and take risks because we have each other."

Rev. Schaef's commitment to social justice and his struggle with the authorities that oppress the poor resulted in over 13 arrests in his lifetime.

Upon retirement the Rev. A. Finley Schaef moved to Saugerties, NY with his wife, Nancy E.K Schaef where they currently reside near children, grandchildren and family.

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Luke 5:1-11 (The Inclusive Bible)

One day, Jesus was standing by Lake Gennesaret, and the crowd pressed in on him to hear the word of God. He saw two boats moored by the side of the lake; the fishers had disembarked and were washing their nets. Jesus stepped into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to pull out a short distance from the shore; then, remaining seated, he continued to teach the crowds from the boat.

When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Pull out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch."

Simon answered, "Rabbi, we've been working hard all night long and have caught nothing; but if you say so, I'll lower the nets."

Upon doing so, they caught such a great number of fish that their nets were at the breaking point. They signaled to their mates in the other boat to come and help them, and together they filled the two boats until they both nearly sank.

After Simon saw what happened, he was filled with awe and fell down before Jesus, saying, "Leave me, Rabbi, for I'm a sinner." For Simon and his shipmates were astonished at the size of the catch they had made, as were James and John, Zebedee's sons, who were Simon's partners.

Jesus said to Simon, "Don't be afraid; from now on you'll fish among humankind." And when they brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

John 21:1-14 (The Inclusive Bible)

Later Jesus again was manifested to the disciples at Lake Tiberias. This is how the appearance took place.

Assembled were Simon Peter, Thomas "the Twin," Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's children, and two other disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I'm going out to fish."

"We'll join you," they replied, and went off to get into their boat.

All through the night they caught nothing. Just after daybreak, Jesus was standing on the shore, though none of the disciples knew it was Jesus. He said to them, "Have you caught anything, friends?"

"Not a thing," they answered.

"Cast your net off to the starboard side," Jesus suggested, "and you'll find something."

So they made a cast and caught so many fish that they couldn't haul the net in. Then the disciple whom Jesus loved cried out to Peter, "It's the Teacher!"

Upon hearing this, Simon Peter threw on his cloak – he was naked – and jumped into the water.

Meanwhile the other disciples brought the boat to shore, towing the net full of fish. They were not far from land—no more than a hundred yards. When they landed, they saw that a charcoal fire had been prepared, with fish and some bread already being grilled. "Bring some of the fish you just caught," Jesus told them. Simon Peter went aboard and hauled ashore the net, which was loaded with huge fish — one hundred fifty-three of them. In spite of the great number, the net was not torn.

"Come and eat your meal," Jesus told them.

None of the disciples dared to ask, "Who are you?" – they knew it was the savior.

Jesus came over, took the bread, and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This marked the third time that Jesus had appeared to the disciples after being raised from the dead.



Donations, in person, to the program can be made Mondays, Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, from 9am to 3pm. Ring the bell on the red door on 13th street or call the number posted at the door.

Food Pantry: Tuesdays; 2pm - 5pm - BY APPOINTMENT ONLY

Appointments are available via the Plentiful App (download from the play/app store). You can search for us, in the app, by name "The Red Door Place" or scroll through the list (towards the bottom) and our pantry will show. After registering on the app you will receive a QR code - BRING the QR code with you to your appointment. Arrive within 5 minutes of your scheduled appointment and present your QR code for scanning.

If you do not have a QR code you will not receive pantry. Note: Missed appointments can be rescheduled to a later open slot or the following Tuesday. If you have any questions call 347-497-9718 and ask for Teresa.

Community Meal:

We will continue to hand out bags of food on Saturdays beginning around 11:30am. Guests may arrive earlier to get a place in line; we have chalk marks on the sidewalk at 6-foot intervals to indicate where people should stand at a safe distance.

THE RED DOOR PLACE - NEEDS MONEY FOR FOOD!

The huge increase in unemployment and homelessness means that The Red Door Place has gone from providing food for 1,700 persons before the pandemic, to 2,500 in April, to now more than 4,000 persons every week. TRDP has plenty of volunteers. What we need is money. We are desperately trying to keep enough food coming in to give out to every guest. TRDP is one of only a few emergency food programs in Manhattan still giving out a significant amount of food to each guest at the pantry on Tuesdays and still offering a hot meal on Saturdays.

OUR ADVENTURE IN ONLINE-ONSITE COMMUNITY



The Church of the Village never "closed" during the Covid-19 pandemic because we shifted our entire ministry to be online in March 2020. Then, as the world began slowly to emerge in the summer of 2021 from the worst of the pandemic, there was no thought among the Church of the Village leadership of "going back" to the way of "doing church" before the pandemic.

Our reality and our reach have changed dramatically in a year. We continue to attract worshippers and receive new members from across the U.S. and beyond its borders, as well as from the New York City area. As a faith community, the Church of the Village is no longer tied to a building. We opened to all of our vaccinated members in September 2021 and to the public in December 2021. Currently, we are still practicing masking and social distancing but not requiring proof of vaccination to enter the building.

People are attracted to the Church of the Village because of our progressive theology, radical inclusivity, extravagant welcome, and focus on social, economic, and climate justice. Many who worship with us or decide to join cannot find this sort of faith community where they live.

We believe it is God's desire that each of us have the chance to have as full a life as possible by seeking the common good in healthy community together.
