SCRIPTURE LESSON

John 5:2-29 (The Inclusive Bible)

Now in Jerusalem, near the Sheep Gate, there is a pool with five porticoes; its Hebrew name is Bethesda. The place was crowded with sick people—those who were blind, lame or paralyzed – lying there waiting for the water to move. An angel of God would come down to the pool from time to time, to stir up the water; the first One to step into the water after it had been stirred up would be completely healed.

One person there had been sick for thirty-eight years. Jesus, who knew this person had been sick for a long time, said, "Do you want to be healed?" "Rabbi," the sick One answered, "I don't have anyone to put me into the pool once the water has been stirred up. By the time I get there, someone else has gone in ahead of me."

Jesus replied, "Stand up! Pick up your mat and walk."

The individual was immediately healed, and picked up the mat and walked away. This happened on a Sabbath. Consequently, some of the Temple authorities said to the one who had been healed, "It's the Sabbath! You're not allowed to carry that mat around!" The healed One explained, "But the person who healed me told me, 'Pick up your mat and walk." They asked, "Who is this who told you to pick up your mat and walk?" The healed person had no idea who it was, since Jesus had disappeared into the crowd that filled the place.

Later on, Jesus met the individual in the Temple and said, "Remember, now, you've been healed. Give up your sins so that something worse won't overtake you." The healed One went off and informed the Temple authorities that Jesus was the One who had performed the healing. It was because Jesus did things like this on the Sabbath that the Temple authorities began to persecute him.

Jesus said to them, "Abba God is working right now, and I am at work as well."

Because of this, the Temple authorities were even more determined to kill him. Not only was he breaking the Sabbath but, worse still, he was speaking of God as "Abba" – that is, "Papa" – thereby making their relationship one of intimacy and equality.

This was Jesus' answer: "The truth of the matter is, the Only Begotten can do nothing alone, but can only follow Abba God's example. For whatever Abba does, the Only Begotten does – and does in the same way. For Abba God loves the Only Begotten, and teaches the Only Begotten by example. And God will show the Only Begotten even greater works than you've seen – works that will astonish you. Indeed, just as Abba God raises the dead and gives them life, so the Only Begotten gives life to anyone at will. For Abba God judges no one, having entrusted all judgment to the Only Begotten, so that all may honor the Only Begotten as they honor Abba God. Whoever doesn't honor the Only Begotten dishonors the One who sent the Only Begotten – Abba God.

The truth of the matter is, whoever listens to my Words and believes in the One who sent me has eternal life and isn't brought to judgment, having passed from death to life.

The truth of the matter is, the hour will come – in fact is here already – when the dead will hear the voice of God's Only Begotten, and all who hear it will live. For just as Abba God is the source of life, God has ordained that the Only Begotten also be the source of life – and be given authority to execute judgment as the Chosen One of God. Don't be surprised at this, because the hour is coming when those in the grave will hear the chosen One's voice and come forth: those who did good will rise to life and those who did evil will rise to condemnation.

This is a Word that honors Desire. **Thanks be to God.**

THE RED DOOR PLACE



Donations, in person, to the program can be made Mondays, Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, from 9am to 3pm. Ring the bell on the red door on 13th street or call the number posted at the door.

Food Pantry: Tuesdays from 3:30-5:30pm. No early line up permitted before 3pm. Lineup will begin behind the rope at 3pm on the corner of 7th Avenue and 13th Street.

We will continue to hand out bags of food on Saturdays beginning around 11:30am. Guests may arrive earlier to get a place in line; we have chalk marks on the sidewalk at 6-foot intervals to indicate where people should stand at a safe distance.

THE RED DOOR PLACE - NEEDS MONEY FOR FOOD!

The huge increase in unemployment and homelessness means that The Red Door Place has gone from providing food for 1,700 persons before the pandemic, to 2,500 in April, to now more than 4,000 persons every week. TRDP has plenty of volunteers. What we need is money. We are desperately trying to keep enough food coming in to give out to every guest. TRDP is one of only a few emergency food programs in Manhattan still giving out a significant amount of food to each guest at the pantry on Tuesdays and still offering a hot meal on Saturdays.

OUR ADVENTURE IN ONLINE-ONSITE COMMUNITY



On Easter Sunday, April 4, 2021 – for the first time since the pandemic shutdown in March 2020 – a group of leaders and artists led portions of worship from the church building in Manhattan (New York City). On April 25, a larger group gathered onsite to celebrate the Baptism of Robert Jairo Morant. On May 23, 2021, a small cohort of members of Church of the Village came to the building to participate in worship. These developments are very exciting and meaningful for those who had been away from this beloved space for more than a year. They were also meaningful for those online who have never and may not ever step foot in the building.

With the increase of cases and hospitalizations due to the Covid-19 Delta variant, we do not know when we will open to the public. We are doing all we can to keep everyone on-site as safe as possible.

As a faith community, the Church of the Village is no longer tied to a building. This is only the beginning and is part of a much bigger vision for our community.

We are not "re-opening" because the Church of the Village never closed — we only shifted our ministry to be completely online for a year. As the world slowly emerges from the Covid-19 pandemic, there's been no thought among the Church of the Village leadership of "going back" to the way of "doing church" before the pandemic. Our reality and reach have changed dramatically in a year. We continue to attract worshippers and receive new members from across the U.S. and beyond its borders, as well as from the New York City area. We are on a journey and living into becoming a fully online and onsite community.

People are attracted to the Church of the Village because of our progressive theology, radical inclusivity, extravagant welcome, and focus on social, economic, and climate justice. Many who worship with us or decide to join cannot find this sort of faith community where they live. We believe it is God's desire that each of us have the chance to have as full a life as possible by seeking the common good in healthy community together. So we are committed to building an online and onsite community to reach as widely as possible. With this vision for online and onsite community, we can re-imagine John Wesley's vision and say that the whole world, literally, can be our parish.
